Community Profile

Indian Hills High School was founded in 1964. Our student population lives in Wyckoff, Franklin Lakes and Oakland, suburban residential communities with a total population of 43,000. The parents of the majority of the students are employed in professional, managerial and executive positions in northern New Jersey and New York City.

School Profile

Indian Hills High School offers a comprehensive program to meet the needs of the entire school population. Because most of the students plan education beyond high school, the curriculum emphasizes college preparation. Indian Hills is a high performing public high school according to the New Jersey Quality Single Accountability Continuum and the New Jersey State Department of Education. There were 1,128 students enrolled in grades 9-12 during the 2016-2017 school year. The school year is divided into 4 quarters and students take quarterly exams.

Curriculum

The school provides students with the opportunity to take Advanced Placement courses, a sequence of Honors courses, college preparatory courses and courses in fine arts, applied arts, business education, and computer applications. Advanced Placement courses offered during the 2016-2017 school year were English, Calculus, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, European History, U.S. History, French, Spanish, Italian, Psychology, Economics, Statistics, Computer Science, Music Theory and Art. The sequence of Honors courses may be selected from a diverse program of Honors electives in the traditional disciplines, or from a more specific group of Honors courses that focus on a career theme in one of our University Programs: International Studies & Business, and Science, Medicine & Research. Students may also attend classes at Paramus Vocational and Technical School.

Students may enroll in dual enrollment courses through partnerships established with Syracuse University, Bergen Community College, or Fairleigh Dickinson University to receive college credit for courses taken in high school. Students have the flexibility to choose from an array of models for developing activities or programs linked to the Core Curriculum Content Standards, such as: interdisciplinary and theme-based programs, independent study, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, distance learning opportunities, internships, community service, or other structured learning experiences through our Option II Program. Students can also pursue one of eight themed electives at various academic levels that provide a rich background in a particular area of study, known as the District's Pathways Program.

Graduation Requirements

Students graduating from Indian Hills High School must have a minimum of 135 credits, including four years of English, three years of Mathematics, three years of Social Studies (two of which must be in United States History), three years of Science, two years of World Language, one year of Visual and Performing Arts, one year of Consumer, Family and Life Skills, Financial Literacy, four years of Physical Education and Health, and additional electives.
